“The aim of the systematic review was to identify barriers to and facilitators of multisectoral action and civic engagement and to suggest validated indicators and tools for assessing the processes and outcomes of participatory governance for health, equity, and well-being in urban settings from published scientific evidence. The report shows that many countries continue to make progress in the fight against tobacco, but efforts must be accelerated to protect people from the harms of tobacco and second-hand smoke.” *Source: World Health Organization*

On September 20 and 21, 2021, the National Academies Roundtable on Population Health Improvement hosted a virtual workshop to explore the nature, use, design of, threats, and changes to places as a resource for health and public spaces as a shared resource. “Climate distress is not a clinical diagnosis, and likely includes healthy and adaptive responses that can lead to productive action against climate change, as well as clinically-relevant distress that requires greater support. Young people have recognised that addressing climate distress needs to go beyond a focus on their individual mental health and include a focus on climate policy. While climate distress is often related to distress about the direct impacts of climate change, it can also include distress relating to a lack of climate action or the impact of media coverage about climate events impacting others. Opportunities have been identified in both clinical and non-clinical settings.”

Measurement and monitoring of diets across countries and population groups is critical. However, there are no harmonized metrics for tracking how the healthfulness of diets around the world is evolving. This report assesses the validity, usefulness and fitness for purpose of existing healthy diet metrics as global and national monitoring indicators, presents a comparative assessment of selected healthy diet metrics and discusses priorities and opportunities to improve diet monitoring.” *Source: World Health Organization*

[Community experiences of the 2022–2023 mpox outbreak in Europe and the Americas](#)

“The survey identified high levels of mpox-related concerns among affected communities, which translated into widespread, temporary adaptations of people’s sexual behaviour to manage their risk. Survey data analysis also identified insufficient and unequal access to mpox testing and vaccination services across settings. People’s self-reported experience of mpox highlighted the role of stigma and discrimination in increasing the emotional distress produced by the physical symptoms of the illness. Findings from this survey provide valuable insights into the experiences and needs of the affected communities and emphasizes the importance of increasing access to vaccination and diagnostics globally. Tailored risk communication and community engagement strategies are essential to respond effectively to future outbreaks and protect at-risk individuals and communities.” *Source: World Health Organization*

“Established ethics principles in outbreak response are: justice, beneficence, utility, respect for persons, liberty, reciprocity and solidarity. [Improvement cultures in health and adult social care settings](#)

“To support the delivery of their strategy, CQC commissioned SQW (in partnership with the Kings Fund Library Service) to deliver a rapid literature review, focusing on improvement cultures in health and adult social care. The review aimed to inform CQC’s approach to assessing and encouraging improvement, improvement cultures and improvement capabilities of services, while strengthening CQC’s regulatory role.” *Source: Care Quality Commission (UK)*

[Optimising antimicrobial stewardship in Australian primary care](#)

“Preventing antimicrobial resistance requires the establishment of antimicrobial stewardship (AMS) practices in prescribing. In Australia, AMS programs are well established in secondary and tertiary care. However, 80% of antibiotics in Australia are prescribed within primary care. Despite this, AMS programs are yet to be widely established within primary care. To prevent antimicrobial resistance, barriers to AMS programs in primary care must be addressed, and interprofessional collaboration between general practice and community pharmacy fostered.” *Source: Deeble Institute (Australia)*
